

When Snowmobilers meet others on the trail!

All winter users have the right to enjoy their chosen activity.

Since trail encounters between snowmobilers and other trail users must be expected, people should respect each other's love of the outdoors and be considerate. You will come across dogsledders, snowshoers, skiers, walkers and even cyclists.

Put yourself in the other persons shoes.... Be respectful. Be safe. They may have dogs or children with them that require extra attention. Slow down, don't scare anyone. Snowmobiles can be intimidating. Other trail users can hear them coming for some time and when they get to you they are wearing helmets so they can't see who you are encountering. Pull to the side if the trail is narrow. Don't scare anyone and lend a hand if needed. It is important that everyone have fun on the trails.

The speed limit is 50 Km/Hr on all OFSC trails and please obey all signage. When it says stay on the trail please do so.

There has been no access granted at this time for riders to leave the OFSC designated trail and access private property. Riders need to earn and keep the respect of local landowners and of their home communities by riding only where authorized and by staying on the OFSC marked trail. The best way to enjoy riding responsibly on authorized trails is to join your local club and ride with other club members.

Groomer Passing

Remember...When approaching an oncoming groomer on the trail, slow down and move your snowmobile to the far right side of the trail. Realize that the grooming drag or tiller behind the grooming tractor may be very wide, and might extend wider than the tracks of the tractor and can essentially take up most (or all) of the trail's width. If the trail is narrow or winding, you may need to stop at the far outside edge of the trail to let the groomer pass. When possible, pull off of the packed section of the trail completely. It is your obligation to get out of his way.
